

Celebrate World Water Day

When we met Mary, we didn't tell her that we were giving her the power to escape disease. We didn't explain to her that we had exponentially increased the likelihood that she would be able to carry her babies to term, and we didn't tell her toddler that we were much more confident he would survive to see his fifth birthday. The teachers at Mary's daughter's school were not told that many of the girls who had been absent for so much of the year would be returning to the classroom. No one told Mary's husband that he was becoming a champion of his community by being trained as a pump caretaker.

We didn't say these things, because we didn't need to. Everywhere Seeds of Hope works, we hear the phrase "Water is life." People know that having access to safe water, means that



everything in their lives can be transformed by the health and hope that clean water brings.

We celebrate often the privilege of bringing this life to so many here in Zambia. In just a few weeks we will join with hundreds of thousands of people to celebrate that clean water is changing lives, not just in Africa, but in nations across the globe.

March 22 is World Water Day, a day to remember why water projects are so important and to commemorate the work being done to bring safe water to people living without it.

Last year, Seeds of Hope celebrated by hosting informational booths at World Water Day events in Lusaka and Ndola. This year, we will be inviting students from schools throughout the Ndola region to tour our resource center and learn about the benefits of having safe water, hygiene, and sanitation. Champion Spotlight

This month, we would like to highlight Seeds of Hope Champion Jake Sherley. Jake is a fulltime firefighter in Kern County, California. He founded Thorn Clthing in 1999 as a means of using fashion to raise money for Christian organizations working in developing countries. Jake's goal is that by selling "one item at a time, we will quench the thirst of one person at a time."

Jake first heard about Seeds of Hope in 2008 during the Christian music event "Spirit West Coast". That summer he began donating the proceeds of Thorn merchandise sold at events and festivals, to water projects in Zambia. He has since designed shirts specifically aimed at raising awareness of the need for water projects in Africa, as well as gaining the support of participants from ABC's "The Bachelor" in fundraising events and promotional appearances.

In September 2010, Jake led a team of five firefighters to Zambia, eager to learn more about our work and help in any way he could. The highlight for Jake was installing BioSand filters in people's homes: "It was overwhelming,

the sense that as I packed the sand into the filter, I literally had my hands in someone else's life, bringing them health and a better life." Through his work in creating a new clothing line for widespread distribution, and organizing creative fundraising events, Jake continues to be part of bringing hope and transformation to communities in Africa.
